We all longed to see Shabaz at peace.

Many years later, when based in Zambia, arranging for two strangers to meet on a busy street in Lusaka became complicated: I'd honestly not noticed whether Luke, whom I had just met for the first time, was a Zambian or a European and couldn't move beyond describing someone "of average height"!

On Racial Justice Sunday, we remember that recognising differences can be enriching. My friend Ijaz and I delighted in sharing our cultures, peoples and history, learning so much about each other's beloved country.

Racial intolerance and injustice are as useless as discrimination based on hair or eye colour.
