
Is your local community a model of peace and harmony among all people?

As the fig tree needs good soil in which to flourish, so those in the prison community need an environment that provides support and sustenance. Through presence, patience, persistence and prayer, chaplains till the ground around them. It can be very poor soil.

## Bl. Miguel Agustín Pro (1891-1927)

"If I meet any long-faced saints in heaven, I will cheer them up with a Mexican hat dance!"

Blessed Miguel Pro SJ joined the Jesuits in Mexico in 1911 and was ordained a priest on 31 August 1925. Known for his infectious humour, ingenuity and acting ability, Mexico's anticlerical laws forced Miguel to practise his ministry secretly and in disguise – but so successfully that he was eventually arrested and sentenced to death by firing squad on 23 November 1927. Miguel refused the blindfold and addressed his executioners, saying, "May God

have mercy on you. May God bless you! Lord, you know I am innocent! With all my heart I forgive my enemies." He then raised his arms, making of himself a crucifix, and shouted out, "Viva Cristo Rey!" (Long live Christ the King!)

The government published many photographs of Miguel's death, hoping – but failing – to intimidate Catholics, who venerated them as relics.

40,000 people accompanied his funeral procession whilst another 20,000 waited at the cemetery.

A Church that sows hope is young: a prophetic Church that, by her presence, says to the broken-hearted and the outcast of the world, "Take heart, the Lord is near. For you too, summer is being born in the depths of winter. From your pain, hope can arise". Brothers and sisters, let us bring this outlook of hope to our world.
